THE OBJECTIVES

The SANAD TAF Micro-Entrepreneur Mentoring Programme in Jordan was designed to support Syrian refugees running micro-businesses by strengthening their leadership, resilience and business sustainability. Delivered in partnership with The Human Edge, this 6-month pilot programme aimed to:

- Provide support and opportunities for Syrian refugee micro-entrepreneurs to earn a sustainable income through the progression and growth of pre-start ideas as well as viable microbusinesses.
- Build trust-based relationships that would foster integration into Jordanian society and reduce social isolation.
- Develop a pool of trained mentors in Jordan capable of supporting underserved entrepreneurs through relational mentoring.

THE CHALLENGE

Refugees face complex and overlapping challenges like economic instability, limited access to capital, social exclusion and the emotional toll of displacement. Many struggle with limited networks, lack of support and isolation from the broader ecosystem.

In this context, mentoring offers more than technical advice. It becomes a human-centred intervention providing emotional support, practical guidance and a space to reconnect with one's purpose and confidence.

How trust-based mentoring supports inclusion, growth and hope in fragile contexts

OUR APPROACH:

The SANAD TAF Micro-Entrepreneurs Mentoring Programme was designed as a high-touch, relationship-based initiative. It included:

- Mentoring Awareness Sessions & recruitment: a two-stage process based on application review and interview.
- A kickstart workshop: a three-day on-site workshop to onboard and train 13 Jordanian professionals as mentors and 13 microentrepreneurs and facilitate pairing process.
- Ongoing support: consisting in monthly reporting, 3
 peers calls for mentors and check-ins to ensure
 relationship quality and continuity.
- **Graduation and reflection**: to close out the programme and allow participants to reflect, celebrate achievements and explore next steps.

Human-centred design

Rooted in trust-based, one-to-one relationships to foster personal and entrepreneurial growth.

Recruitment and matching

13 Syrian refugee entrepreneurs was selected and paired with 13 trained mentors.


Capacity for impact

Equipping both mentors and mentees with the skills and confidence needed to engage fully in the mentoring process.

On-going support

Supported mentoring pairs with regular check ins and facilitated events to strengthen relationships and ensure lasting outcomes.





Personal Growth and Strengthening of Leadership




Business Growth, Sustainability, and Success

- At programme start: 7 mentees had existing businesses; 6 were at ideation stage.
- By programme end: 10 were running micro-businesses; of those that aren't, one is working full-time, one is a student working part-time, and one has been moved to the Azraq Camp.

Economic Growth, Job Creation and Retention



While job creation was not a key focus due to early-stage business maturity, revenue increases and business progression suggest strong future potential for economic contribution.

The SANAD TAF Micro-Entrepreneurs Mentoring Programme demonstrated that structured mentoring supports economic resilience and personal transformation among refugee entrepreneurs. By focusing on trust, emotional wellbeing and leadership, the programme created space for entrepreneurs to grow, plan and move forward with renewed energy. In fragile contexts, mentoring isn't just support, it's a catalyst for inclusion, confidence and sustainable business growth.
